

Additional Separation Options

Inspections & Enforcement

After January 2022

- Compliance reviews of commercial solid waste accounts (2+ cubic yards)
 <u>By 1/31/2022 and annually thereafter</u>
- Quarterly route reviews
- Inspection of <u>edible food generators</u> and food recovery organizations
- Investigation of complaints

After January 1, 2024

 Notice of Violation (NOVs) and fines issued to non-compliant generators by the jurisdiction

Jurisdiction Procurement Requirements

Beginning January 1, 2022

- 1. Jurisdiction must procure a quantity of organic waste products (either compost or renewable natural gas) based on population
- 2. At least 75% of annual purchases of paper products and printing/writing paper must be recycled content paper



Required Ordinances and Policies

By January 1, 2022

- Recycling/organics ordinance for all gene
- Self-haul/back-haul reporting ordinance
- Edible food recovery ordinance
- CALGreen building standards ordinance
- Enforcement ordinance
- Hauler regulation ordinance
- Procurement policies for organic waste pression
- Potential amendment of existing ordinances, policies, or procedures to remove restrictions prohibited by SB 1383 for some organics-related locally-adopted standards and policies



Funding Options

Increase rates, charge for organics

Restructure trash, recycling, & organics rates

Franchise Fees



Case Study: Santa Cruz County (January 2018)

Requirement	Approach
Collection	3-Carts for All; provision for de-minimis Food for MFD & Commercial Single-Family Food Scraps, no cost at County option
Processing	Merchant facility while local facility developed
Education/ Outreach	Extensive print and mailed media Technical Assistance to all Generators (4 FTEs)
Inspection	Hauler responsible for identification, tagging County/Hauler partner on outreach
Policy/ Enforcement	County Code (Sect. 7.20) prohibiting disposal of >5% recyclables in MSW to be modified in to include food as covered material. County enforcement. Hauler regulations
Food Rescue	Franchise exemption for rescued/donated food Food rescue to be added to outreach toolkit
Funding	Increased Rates; Charges for Recycling & Organics Dedicated funding in rates for organics facility

Case Study: San Ramon (October 2019)

Requirement	Approach
Collection	Universal Roll-out, 3-Carts for All, Day 1
Processing	Residential/Commercial processed separately
Education/ Outreach	Flexible outreach planning w/ \$200K/year budget Technical Assistance to all Generators (4.5 FTEs)
Inspection	Hauler responsible for identification, tagging Final contamination/inspection plan based on final draft regulations
Policy/ Enforcement	Early adoption of mandatory requirements to coincide with start of new franchise services Contractor to provide 2,000 CY/year compost/mulch
Food Rescue	Franchise exemption for rescued/donated food Food rescue part of outreach
Funding	Increased Rates Charges for Recycling & Organics SB 1383 Fee to fund City obligations
